plague that struck London from the 1300s to the late 1600s was bubonic plague. Bubonic plague is a disease of rodents, especially black rats. It is passed between them by bites from their fleas. When a rat dies from the plague, its fleas must find a new host to live on. If their new host is a person, the disease can spread to humans too.
